History of Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a holiday celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November. Thanksgiving Day is a time for many people to give thanks for what they have. The first American Thanksgiving was celebrated in 1621, to commemorate the harvest reaped by the Plymouth Colony after a harsh winter. It became an official federal holiday in 1863, during the Civil War. President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed a national day of "Thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens", to be celebrated on the last Thursday in November. Today, our Thanksgiving is the fourth Thursday of November. This was set by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1939, who changed it from Abraham Lincoln's designation. This was approved by congress in 1941.




Varsity Cheerleading


Jr. High Cheerleading





Eighth Grade Profiles




